





ON BUTTERFLIES

Spot swordtail



Butterflies - they fly and die quickly. They are hard to catch; some of them resemble dead leaves. Some of them are unexpected in their beauty and design. Some of them are glassy, some of them have tails, some of them have spots, some of them are white, some of them are black, some of them are metallic - and all of them, despite seeming similar to other butterfly species, have that one small thing that tells you that they all look the same. They are not what I expected and they have taken over my life.

In school, I drew butterflies easily: pairs of wings and a cylinder in the centre. When I got older, I just stopped drawing butterflies altogether. During the pandemic, I drew the outlines of butterflies on borrowed paper and admired my handiwork but I forgot about it afterwards. Working at the Heritage Centre, I never assumed that an opportunity for me to draw them again would arise.

I do not know much about their behaviours and characteristics but I know how to understand their appearance better. I see the hope they present in their short-lived lives and the joys they partake in as they flit around. The length of their life is not proportional to the beauty they hold. Perhaps, it leads to the analogy that everything in life is temporary, even the good.

They have taught me to think about life in ways I did not before.






STATE OF BOMBAY

At the Heritage Centre, we have an extensive collection of photographs. Most images belong to the Central Photographic Section Collection, while others are from the Gourishankar Collection. Our other collections consist mainly of contributions from alumni and independent photographers.


A few albums in the collections contain photos from an experiment conducted decades ago at IIT Madras. These are albums 0040, 0041, 0212 and 0321. The albums contain images of two large tunnel-like structures and a model of a ship between them. I also found a note alongside this photograph (please see the next page).

From this note, I could gather that this experiment took place at the Department of Applied Mechanics (as mentioned in the above image). I decided to check the Annual Report of the Institute for more information. The report published by the Department of Applied Mechanics in the Annual Report of IIT Madras, 1969-70 notes that "The Wind Tunnel erection work including the calibration of the six component balance was completed." This gave me a rough idea of when the wind tunnel was introduced to IIT Madras.

It was just the beginning of an interesting few days, during which I discovered a significant amount of history about IIT Madras and the ship called *State of Bombay*. I would finally be able to put the missing pieces together and find the appropriate captions and descriptions for the photographs in our collection!

A note which was found alongside the photograph Album 0041 - 1270_1

I referred to a ResearchGate article* to find out what a smoke nuisance test is. I learned that the test is conducted to find out ways to prevent exhaust smoke from coming back into the ship, which causes inconveniences to passengers. Quite interesting! The wind tunnel blows air, allowing people to test the model of the ship in real-life conditions created by the device. I had a lot of the answers that I was looking for.

I have created a comic strip that briefly explains the metadata-creation process for the photographs of the wind tunnel and the model of *State of Bombay*.





The comments section was filled with experiences shared by various people who had travelled aboard the many ships which regularly plied between India and East Africa. It was nice to see them interacting with one another after decades.

The screenshots to the right will show you some of the accounts which were shared by former passengers of the *State of Bombay*. The QR code will take you to a web page with an article titled *Voyages between Mombasa and Bombay – SS Khandalla and SS Amra* written by Thomas Joseph.

Nutan says:



Once the elimination was complete, the rest of the objects were rearranged and appropriately stacked, glued or hung. New boxes were purchased and stirrers, paper plates, spoons and forks were invited to occupy the new residences. The snacks were housed on the ground floor and the first floor was occupied by cutlery (see above image).

I am no interior designer, but I thought that we could make use of vertical space in the pantry which meant that the attractive slab which was once a trainwreck could finally see the light. The coffee sachets were suspended from the wall using adhesive putty and a brand-new tissue dispenser was made using a tea box. 


