

The Maestro and the Governor

When Ilaiyaraaja and R. N. Ravi visited the Heritage Centre

When we were told that Ilaiyaraaja and Mr. R. N. Ravi, the Hon'ble Governor of Tamil Nadu, were going to visit the Heritage Centre, we were dumbfounded. Meeting Ilaiyaraaja, the man who moves millions with his music, was a once-in-alifetime opportunity. Preparations were underway on Saarang day, and we eagerly awaited the arrival of the two dignitaries on the 9th of January, 2025.

But before that, we had to prepare the Centre. We weren't entirely sure if they would actually turn up. The Heritage Centre is used to scheduled visits being cancelled at the eleventh hour, and we were anticipating this to be one of them, given the packed schedule planned for the two eminent visitors.

Earlier that day, Cairo visited us. The Director obliged, and the dignitaries were shown the various aspects of IIT Madras's history. Towards the end, we requested them to sign the autograph book, which had been strategically placed near the back entrance. The lighting and location provided the perfect backdrop for photographs to be taken.


Earlier, I had sketched caricatures of both Ilaiyaraaja and R. N. Ravi, hoping I could get them to sign them. The caricatures were placed near the autograph book. However, I was unable to request their signatures due to the crowd that stood between me and the guests.

Finally, I managed to ask Mamata Ma'am to put in a word about the caricatures. She approached the Governor without hesitation and requested him to sign next to his caricature. He cracked a smile upon seeing the caricature of himself. Unfortunately, the marker I had placed was faulty, but I had no idea about this. When the Governor attempted to sign with the marker but dropped it instantly, he swiftly reached for his regal pen. It didn't immediately occur to me that this was due to the marker's



incompetence. Ilaiyaraaja, however, signed with the marker and handed it back to me. His finger brushed mine as he gave it to me, and for a brief moment, I thought I might have absorbed some of his musical prowess. My neighbors, however, seemed to disagree.

In the R. N. Ravi caricature, you'll notice an incomplete signature beneath his autograph. This partial signature was made with the marker. In the llaiyaraaja caricature, you may observe a faded signature—this is because he signed using the marker. Overall, the visit was inspiring. Jabaraj managed to capture some stunning images on his phone, and one of his clicks is featured on the cover of this issue of *Glass Panels*.

Butterflies, Bees, Bugs and Blossoms

BOMBED BY BUTTERFLIES AND BLOOMS

When images of butterflies mud puddling were being posted on Facebook, they pulled me out of my stupor to witness this fascinating phenomenon. After identifying the likely places where I could observe it, I reached the IITM stadium at 8:30 am and walked across the small bridge connecting the road to the stadium. The sight that revealed itself was out of this world. The stadium's boundary was lush and green, with the grass on the ground fresh and vibrant. But it was the air that held me spellbound for many minutes; it was filled with dancing clouds of butterflies. The areas near the ground and on the ground itself were teeming with butterflies spiraling in and out of formations beyond imagination — a truly mesmerizing sight!

The entrance to the stadium had a couple of Gulmohur trees adorned with flowers, which were teeming with Emigrant and Lime butterflies. It was as if the tree were alive, dancing in the air. In the CSIR campus, the scene was the same, with Emigrants, Gull butterflies, Limes, and Pioneers filling the airspace, while the Awls preferred the shade. June, July, and August are the months when butterfly migration can be observed in Chennai. Although about 10 species were sighted as migrants, three species predominated from the last week of June to the third week of July this year. The species I frequently spotted were the Emigrant, Common Lime, Lime Blue. Common Gull, and Pioneer.

Finding a spot where the butterflies were mud puddling was not hard. One such spot was wet and close to the turf. Settling down near the spot, I was initially unsure whether to capture the groups or the individuals. Soon, my camera found its way around the puddlers and unraveled a sight that is hard to describe in words. The Emigrants would settle down first after being disturbed, followed by the Common Limes. The Lime Blues did not mingle with the Emigrants and Common Limes. Once settled, they hardly moved. Not so with the Emigrants and Common Limes, who were constantly moving in and out of the congregation, especially the Common Limes. I also observed a lone Common Gull among the Emigrants mud puddling.

There was a strong breeze trying to push down the butterflies that were on the ground, but they were not to be deterred. When the breeze was strong, all the wings were pushed to one side, and when the breeze let up, all would simultaneously straighten up—a delightful sight to watch!

I came across an interesting article by Ernest M. Shull on the migration pattern of the *Catopsilia* butterfly (Emigrants), based on his observations from September 19–24, 1946. Here is a passage:

"According to PEILE, (2H. D. Peile, A Guide to Collecting Butterflies in India, p. 59) species of *Catopsilia* often migrate in swarms/but this flight was of quite a different type. On this day and the five days following the Emigrants (*Catopsilia*) They were not flying in swarms, but in three distinct lines across the mission

compound, usually starting about 10:00 A. M. and continuing until 3:00 P.M. Each of the three lines was approximately one hundred vards from any other. This movement resembled a group of school children playing "follow-the-leader," except their course was straight and in a southerly direction. They had a swooping flight, closing their wings completely between strokes. When I stood in the direct path of the migration, they would not deflect their course to either side but instead increased their flying height (incidentally, just out of reach of the net). Only a very few stopped to rest, and then only for a few seconds on the undersides of a leaf. The red-flowered bush (Hibiscus), which was directly in the line of migration, temporarily attracted a few of the passersby. In order to net a resting specimen I stood near the bush with my net in readiness. One step forward and a quick swing was sometimes successful. The vast majority, however, of this migrating horde pressed relentlessly onward without faltering or yielding to wayside attractions.

Without any clocking device, the speed of migration was roughly estimated to be between ten and fifteen miles per hour. In ordinary flight, Catopsilia are rapid fliers, but in migration, their flight is even faster. "

Wish I had come across this article earlier. In the last week of July, I noticed that the numbers of all the mentioned butterflies dwindled, leaving only a few Emigrants and Lime butterflies. In the IITM campus, I observed crows feasting heavily on the Emigrants, picking them off the host plant,

Cassia. The young Cassia plants had been stripped bare of leaves. possibly by the caterpillars of the Emigrant butterflies. I've observed that the butterflies seem to prefer flowers from wild herbs, shrubs, and trees over those from cultivated plants and

Abundant blooms were seen everywhere. Among the cultivated plants, Curry Leaf, Wingpod Purslane, Gulmohar, and Bougainvillea stood out in feeding the army of butterflies observed during the month of July. Among the wild flowering plants and trees, Tridax, Rauvolfia, Indian Beech Tree, Sweet Indrajao, and the Politician's Flower were particularly popular.




Kabilan's Barrier

A TREE-PLANTER FROM THE 1960S

Inspired by your article in Glass Panels on tree planting in the 1980s by our erstwhile Prof. Y. Narayana Rao, I would like to bring to the attention of our alumni how the willpower of one individual can change the environment of a society.

In the early 1960s, unlike the area already developed by the Raj Bhavan, the area south of Taramani Guest House was completely barren of trees. The Cauvery and Krishna hostels stood without barriers, accessible to the inhabitants of Velachery and their cattle. Kabilan, a mechanical engineering student from the 1961–66 batch, was the first to be inspired to change things for the better. Unlike ceremonial tree planters who act occasionally, Kabilan believed that one could grow many trees at once. As a loner, he couldn't achieve much on his own, so he sought the help of the Warden and the Director.

Those were the days when the Director, Prof. B. Sengupto, was powerful and ever ready to develop the Institute. At very short notice, boxing was included as a sport at the request of Sarathy (erstwhile Madras University boxing champion), with the necessary kits provided and a tournament held near the Krishna Hostel mess hall. Even students who wanted a swimming pool were given a long rope, with the proviso that the excavation would be carried out by them, and the rest would be taken care of by the Institute. Unfortunately, the result was an unfinished pit

near Cauvery Hostel, similar to other pits and ponds around Krishna Hostel that served as waterholes for the cattle of Velachery.

Kabilan too was given the green signal, with the understanding that he would limit his activities to Krishna Hostel. Soon, he and his friends transformed the periphery of Krishna Hostel with a lush growth of saplings. Alas, this greenery attracted the cattle of Velachery, forcing Kabilan to seek the Institute's help again to protect the young trees. The Institute wasn't shy to help. For the first time, Krishna Hostel was surrounded by barbed wire. It was even nicknamed "Kabilan's Barrier."

While attending the 25th reunion at IIT Madras, our classmates planned a visit to Krishna Hostel but found it extremely difficult. We were lost in a maze of fully grown trees that blocked and hid our hostel from view. It was the same with other hostels too. Though we were saddened to hear that some later Technology Park-related developments at IIT were delayed due to the need for environmental clearance, we remain proud of Kabilan's initiative that brought about this transformation.


