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TENNIS - Semi finals:

The Bombay-Madras match lived up to expectations and produced some really grod tennis. The singles between Kasturi and Fazalbhoy was Tennis at its best. The shuttle court seems to be a breeding ground for unpleasant incidents, Last night we had occasion to observe Garg of Kanpur trying shuttles and the crowd's patience for what seemed an eternity before he condescended to select a few for the match.
