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# DRAMATICS

Saras cashed the dramatics with a good play, "Slow Death on the Killing Ground" by William Henley. John Tharakan and Anand Kasturi played their parts to perfection, expressing regret, profundity, sorrow and aloofness as and when required in the play.

Randall (Tharakan), the guy with a high IQ, walks into a cola store, owned by Glas (with one s) (Kasturi) and sets the ball rolling with his glib tongue and profound statements - "My mom teld me never to make a long story short," "I have a hole in my heart, "If the dead require the sun, a candle will do for the living." The conversation goes on and as they play the 'little game' of conducting proceedings against each other as in a court, they remember with regret their past actions. Glas, a Jew, remembers how he abandoned his wife and son and become a freight train driver,

transporting Jews to the concentration camp. And Randall - how he killed his mother. - A highly emotional play.

Jamuna put up "Answers", a rather macabre play in which two police officers (Irani and N. Sundar) question a murder suspect (Bhasker). They torture him and abuse him - some pretty harsh scenes - till they trick him into incriminating himself - a shocking and violent play on the methods of the police.

Godav's play, "Prizes" by P. G. Wodehouse, with the humour of our favourite characters Bertie (Vasant Victor), Gus (Roy) and Jeeves (DJ) was a nice change. Sarayu's choice of a G. B. Shaw play wasn't too good but Sukanya and Mangala carried it off well. "Incomity" by Ganga, a parody on company meetings with Anilesh, Joe, Sreenath, Raguram, George, ... in its cast took the third prize.

Narmada put up a serious play, "Monica", while Mandak's "The Valiant Villain" was quietly humorous. Milind Gadre as Febronica was good.
